

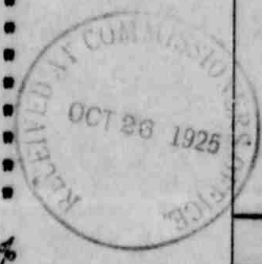

Sir:-

I beg to refer you to my letter dated August 21st last, in which I informed you that I was holding back a voucher in favour of Matthew Wylie of Regina, representing the moving of an Engine and Generator at the Duck Lake Residential School, pending an endeavour to arrive at a settlement, as I considered Mr. Wylie's account for labour and material, amounting to \$673.65, was altogether too high in view of the services performed.

I am supported in my belief by the Principal of the School and one of our Inspectors who has examined the work and both these men agree with me that too much time was spent in performing this work. However, I have gone thoroughly into the matter and find that Mr. Wylie's receipts for the payment of material and labour are all in order and in view of this, feel that we are helpless and have no other alternative but to pay the account.

I took the matter up ~~strongly~~ with Mr. Wylie with the hope of having the account reduced but have been unsuccessful as Mr. Wylie asserts that the account is not too large in view of the work performed.

I may inform you that the Engine and Dynamo were first installed in an inner room at the school in which there was no ventilation and it was found that the gas evaporated from it caused a great deal of annoyance and was sufficient to suffocate anyone going into the room. It was therefore necessary and very important that the Engine and Generator should be moved to an outer room where there was adequate ventilation. Mr. Wylie was the electrician employed by the Contractors and it was a most natural thing to employ him, as he was familiar with the situation. My arrangement with Mr. Wylie was that he was to do the work on a cost plus 10% basis.

I trust that the foregoing information will enable the Department to clear the matter up. I am enclosing herewith full details of the account, and would recommend that it be paid.

I beg to inform you that the work in connection with repairs to the sewerage disposal system at the Duck Lake Indian Residential School is now nearing completion.

A carload of crushed rock had to be brought in from Saskatoon for this work; we had to more or less re-roof the septic tank, which is a large tank and an old one; the manholes had to be changed and the water diverted from the laundry and engine room to the main sewage drain.

I expect that the work will be completed in a few days time, and the job will be a satisfactory one I think.

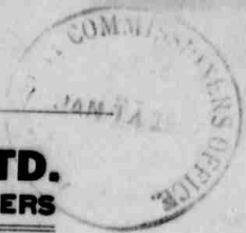

This work has been carried out in accordance with the recommendations of the Sanitation Bureau of Public Health for the Province of Saskatchewan. The cost was in the first place estimated at \$1200.00. I sent an Inspector from this office to get the work under way and it has been completed in a satisfactory manner for considerably less than the estimate. The amount charged for labour in Messrs. Beaton & Brady's account was not sufficiently supported by Time Sheets and I have amended the account rather than keep these men waiting any longer for their money. I am taking the matter up with them and if they have made a mistake and omitted a Time Sheet, the matter of the small difference can be adjusted.

I would recommend that this account, as submitted, be paid.

I beg to inform you that when the furnishings for the Duck Lake Indian Residential School were authorized, a refrigerator was included in the list. This was not bought at the time as it was thought that a refrigerator of suitable size could not be obtained. The Rev. Principal is very much of the opinion that we should have a special refrigerator and cold storage built, the cost of which would not be much greater than that of a large refrigerator which would not hold a whole carcass of beef. The proposed cold storage room will cost about \$884.00 and will hold a carcass of beef, as well as that of a hog, and will also furnish a cool room for other supplies.

I should be glad to have your authority to go ahead and have such a cold storage room erected. A rough sketch of the proposed room is attached hereto.

In submitting the vouchers for payment, the Acting Principal states that since the burning of the old school, the Farming Instructor and Mechanic have been living in two Indian houses, the occupation of which, the Indians now wish to resume. Material was therefore purchased to provide convenient quarters for the Farming Instructor in the top story of the old wash house, but the School undertook to perform the labour. 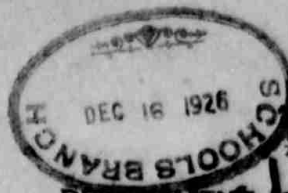

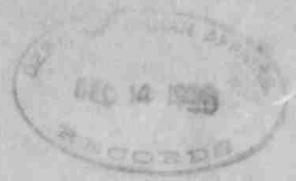

Sir:-

I beg to inform you that Inspector Murison recently visited the Duck Lake Indian Residential School, and reports that the drainage system is not satisfactory, and that the work that was done last Fall does not clear up the situation there, although we carried out the instructions furnished us by the Engineer of the Provincial Government here.

The drain from the School to the septic tank is about 1350 feet long. The first manhole is 325 feet from the building; the second one is 574 ft. from the first, and the third is 444 ft. from the second, this latter one being right at the septic tank. The general opinion of the Inspector and those at the school is that the pipes are not properly connected and cemented, and that a lot of the fluid escapes, causing clogging. I am told that the drop from the School to the septic tank is only 2½ ft. over this 1350 feet of piping, and if the pipes are not properly cemented the chances are that we will always have trouble. It is thought also that there are not sufficient manholes along the line to permit of cleaning the pipe out with rods. It is suggested that there should be a manhole every 100 ft. Your Engineer will be able to decide as to the number there should be in a drain of this length.

I do not believe anything further can be done this year. I should not be surprised if it were found necessary to dig all the piping up and cement the connections, and perhaps deepen the drain at the far end. The contractors, Messrs. Smith Bros. & Wilson state that the work was properly done and there is no way of finding this out without digging out the whole line. However, nothing can be done during the present winter.

I am enclosing herewith a report on the various schools in the Duck Lake Agency, which were inspected by Mr. Murison. You will notice that he speaks well of Mr. Goodman, the teacher of the North Day School on James Smith's Reserve, and the good work that is being done by Mrs. Goodman the Field Matron. The residence of the teacher at this point requires exterior painting. It would take very little money to do this work, and if it were available in the Spring I think possibly we could have the work done by Indians. The request of the Field Matron to have a pasture for her ponies and the cow is one that I think we should grant. It would cost about \$50.00 to have a suitable pasture provided, and if funds are available for this purpose I will have the matter attended to first thing in the Spring.

The attendance at the South Day School does not seem to be all that it should. Out of an enrollment of 28 there were 16 present. I am not very much impressed with the practise of supplying children with second hand clothing; they never look well and a boy of fourteen going around with an adult's coat on, and girls wearing discarded dresses of all colours and styles does not give a very good impression to a person visiting the school.

The John Smith's Day School seems to be doing satisfactory work, although the attendance does not seem to be as good as it might be. I am not taking any notice of the difficulty they are having with the hot air furnace. It seems to me that the Agent or the teacher could look after this.



With regard to the Inspector's remarks dealing with the sewage disposal system at the St. Michael's Boarding School, I have your authority to have this system thoroughly overhauled in the Spring, and this will be done as soon as the weather permits. The necessity for outbuildings at this school is pointed out. An item of \$5200.00 has been placed in the Estimates to provide a cow barn and root house, but I doubt very much whether this will be sufficient to supply a henhouse, piggery and killing house. The necessity for these buildings was not brought to my attention at the time the Estimates were being prepared. We may, however, save some of the \$5200.00 and apply it on these extra buildings which are apparently necessary. You will note that the Principal has 105 head of cattle. Surely we are not going to be expected to put up a barn to accommodate this number. At our largest schools we provide for about thirty head of live stock. We must have an understanding regarding this before any expense is incurred. They should have shelters for the young stock and we should only provide for the milking cows. I think you will agree with me in this.

The school is suffering considerably through lack of vegetables this year. You will note in the report that the crop was an entire failure and that it has been necessary to bring in potatoes. All our reserves in the northern part of the province, including the northern part of Alberta, suffered severely from the August frost.

On the whole the reports on the Duck Lake Agency and Schools appear to be very satisfactory, and if we get through the present winter with our stock I feel that there will be a substantial increase in the cattle and also in farming operations next year.

ST. MICHAEL'S R.C. RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL (Cont'd)

I examined the sewage disposal plant and the outbuildings. I also went through the school building and noted conditions. I did not examine the children in the class room.

The Principal, who is the Rev. Father Delmas, was absent but was expected back by Christmas. His place has been taken during his absence by the Rev. Father Chevallier. There are 140 pupils on the roll, 76 boys and 64 girls. The health of the children was particularly good at the time of my visit. I was present at the evening meal and noted that an abundance of wholesome food was provided. This includes all the milk the children care to have. There were 20 cows being milked at the time of my visit which provides sufficient milk and butter for their requirements.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

It is unnecessary for me to describe the main building; it is quite new and in excellent condition. The Principal, however, complains that the windows fit badly and the North and East rooms are hard to keep warm on this account. He complains particularly of the difficulty in heating the sewing room. I have already reported to you verbally regarding the condition of the septic tank and you have brought this matter to the attention of the Department.

The out-buildings, with the exception of the horse stable, are very old and inconvenient. An up-to-date cow barn, root house, hen house, piggery and killing house is required. They have very poor accommodation for butchering animals, in fact they have none. They were killing hogs on the day of my visit, a cold day; the hogs were killed outside and taken into the blacksmith shop to be scalded and dressed and I could see the necessity for a

proper building to do this work in. The old laundry building is being used temporarily as a Farmer's residence. This building is very old and the arrangement can only be considered as a temporary one.

There is a good farm in operation at this school. They have 700 acres of land in the immediate vicinity of the school and 400 acres of hay land a few miles away. They threshed in 1926, 3500 bushels of wheat from 210 acres, 3400 bushels of oats from 70 acres and 800 bushels of barley from 20 acres. The yield off their wheat crop was affected by the frost; a year ago they had over 7,000 bushels. Their live stock comprises 105 cattle, 26 horses and 41 hogs. They have a large garden at the school but this year they have no vegetables as their garden stuff was destroyed by frost in August. Their potato supply is being shipped in from outside points.

Dear Mr. Scott:-

The matter of outbuildings that it is proposed to build at the Duck Lake Indian Residential School is one that I think should be attended to without delay. The difficulty we have experienced in the past has been in getting our authority rather late in the season, at a time when most of the carpenters and tradesmen have arranged for their summer's work, and you will appreciate the difficulty in getting men under such circumstances. Then again, the season is so short here that if we do not get the work started in May we are usually working late into the Fall, and never get a satisfactorily completed job - usually carrying over some of the work until the following year. I should be glad, therefore, if steps could be taken to have our building programme arranged as soon as possible.

A cattle barn, to hold 28 to 30 head is badly needed at this school. A poultry house is also required, as one was not built at the time the school was erected. There is urgent need for outside quarters for the help. In a conversation with the Principal, Father Delmas, he tells me that he would like to have two small cottages to accommodate two married men and their families. You will appreciate that at a school of this kind where farming is done on such an extensive scale it is necessary to have a staff of men. It is estimated that the two cottages could be built for approximately \$4500.00, as the Father would undertake to do a certain amount of the freighting and excavating, as well as any other work which could be done by the staff and bigger boys



at the school. The other buildings which are required are a diggery and a root cellar. A root cellar at an institution of this kind is rather an important thing to have, as a great many roots are grown and used. As you know, it is necessary to have a separate root house, as roots cannot be stored in the main building, and besides, there is not room for them. # 200

There is another matter which I was told to bring to your attention in the Spring, i.e.- that of the drain leading from the main building to the septic tank. Something will have to be done to put this in shape, as it has never worked properly since the time it was first put in. 400

I shall hope to hear from you at the earliest possible date regarding the foregoing matters.

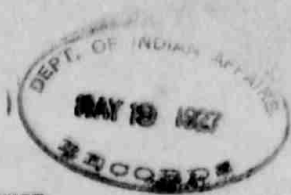

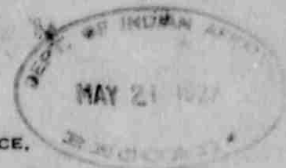

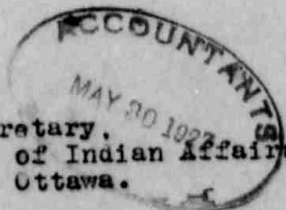

I had some correspondence with you in regard to the sewage disposal plant at the Duck Lake Residential School, and under cover of Department letter No. 109-1-5 dated the 6th May last I was advised that an appropriation of \$400.00 had been set aside to effect needed improvements.

Inspector W. Murison recently went to Duck Lake to make an inspection there and I requested him to look carefully into this matter. In the meanwhile I received a letter from the Director, Division of Sanitation, of the Saskatchewan Department of Public Health, pointing out that an official of the Department had visited the School and recommended certain work being done to put this plant in proper working order. He also pointed out that its unsatisfactory condition since installation was to be attributed to the fact that a qualified drainage engineer had not been employed on the work when it was originally done. Inspector Murison went over the ground again with the official of the Department of Public Health and has found that the drain pipes, which he uncovered in five places, had not been properly laid and that the pipes in three instances were leaking, owing to defective joints. He found also that no fluid was passing into the filter in the septic tank and the distributing pans were dry. This was owing to the drain pipe

drain pipe being frozen between the disposal plant and one of the manholes, which no doubt was due to the fact that part of the pipe line was no more than two feet below the surface of the ground. The roof of the disposal plant is not of sufficient strength to carry the covering which has to be placed on it in the winter months.

The recommendation of the Department's Engineer involves the taking up of the old pipe and relaying ~~under~~ under the supervision of a competent engineer who will see that ~~the~~ levels are taken. It is not considered that more than 25% or 30% of the old pipe can be salvaged as vitrified tile is of such a brittle nature. Four manholes should also be constructed and the present roof replaced by one of reinforced concrete. The cost of the manholes, the vitrified tile, labour and cement and taking up and laying pipes, the building of the reinforced concrete roof, the services of a qualified engineer, and finally the purchase of proper sewer cleaning tools will involve an expenditure of approximately \$1600. Some other work such as covering a portion of the pipe line with a sufficient quantity of earth to protect it from freezing in the winter will be done by the School children. X The Principal will also take care of the cartage and the cost of excavating and back filling, provided the work is done before the 15th July when his big boys will go home for their holidays.

I shall be glad, therefore, if the Department will sanction the additional expenditure necessary to place this plant in proper operating condition.

In answer to your letter of July 8th., we beg to state that our letter of Sept. 11th, 1925 covered most of the ground on this matter.

As far as the laying of the pipes is concerned this was done by the same man who laid the sewers at Lebret Punnichy, Cardston, and a good many of the sewers in Regina and was laid under the constant supervision of Mr. Taillon the inspector who established all the levels.

With reference to leaky joints, we do not think it usual to expect tile drains to be laid subject to temperature changes, and with cement joints and still expect them to be absolutely water tight under pressure. In any case this sewer was subjected to approximately 60 lbs. water pressure by the school representative, Mr. Poiret, at the time he was attempting to clear the line, and he could very well have started some of the joints at that time.

We are of the opinion that this 1370 feet of sewer will always be troublesome at the grade it had to be laid. The plans are somewhat misleading to the ordinary man as the fall appears to be good but the plans are drawn to vertical scale of 4 ft. to the inch so that the actual grade is one tenth of the grade on the drawings and actual conditions were that even less grade could be got than that shown on the plan. All this was pointed out to the Inspector and he placed the levels and lived on the job all the time.

This installation is not and never will be entirely satisfactory under its present conditions. It requires a lot of water and constant supervision but we do not consider any responsibility rests on us on this account.

As stated above the system was laid under Mr. Taillon's supervision and to his instruction. He accepted the system after seeing every foot of pipe laid and we must repudiate any responsibility for the present conditions.

Sir-

With reference to your letter of the 24th. ultimo No. 109-1-5 regarding the sewage disposal system at the Duck Lake Indian Residential School, I have taken the matter up with Messrs. Smith Bros. and Wilson, of Regina, and they take no responsibility whatever in connection with the condition of the system. I am enclosing copy of a letter from this firm, from which you will note that the installation is not and never will be satisfactory under present conditions, and that it requires a lot of water and constant supervision. They point out that the system was installed under the supervision of the Department's Inspector, Mr. Taillon, who established all the levels and accepted the installation after seeing all the pipes laid. I am not sure that 60 lbs. of pressure was ever used on these pipes; I have never heard that it was. I quite agree with Messrs. Smith Bros. and Wilson when they say that this 1370 feet of sewer will always be troublesome at the grade it had to be laid. I believe there is only a fall of 2½ feet to the entire length of 1370 feet.

I would recommend that the work as suggested in the penultimate paragraph of my letter of June 9th. be carried out by the Department at the earliest possible date, so that we will be sure to have it completed before there is any possibility of frost. The figure which I have had quoted for the work is \$1600.00.

Dear Sir:

Answering your communication 100-11A of the 27th instant with reference to the question of fire fighting equipment, I beg to say that this Residential School is provided with two (2) inside fireproof stairs, two (2) outside iron fire escapes and ten (10) fire hoses of not over 30 feet in length. The capacity of the pressure tank, although sufficient for our usual needs, would be altogether inadequate in case of fire. The out-building have no protection whatever. A stand-pipe of a large capacity is necessary to remediate to this deficiency.

Except for the hoses, we have no fire fighting apparatus. Two dozens of five-gallons fire extinguishers, one dozen of pick-axes and one dozen of fire pails are a most urgent necessity.

Seissons is in charge of the older boys, and I consider him a splendid teacher. He holds a Second Interim Saskatchewan Certificate. His manner is good and he certainly has the class room well under control.

The other three class rooms are taught by Sr. St. Melaine, Sr. St. Boniface and Sr. St. Ulric. I must say the children all read well, as though they understood, and in the other subjects examined, they answered quite freely. Their books were all well kept and the work neatly done. The pupils were neatly dressed, clean, and apparently healthy. The class rooms were spotless well lighted and well aired.

The sewing room was in charge of another Sister and the work exhibited is certainly a credit to the school. I have seen no better work in any school inspected.

The laundry was not in operation, but everything was in splendid order.

The kitchen department, as usual, was busy, but everything was in such splendid order that one could hardly credit that the work required to feed 175 people was being carried on.

The building, as the Department knows, is new so I need not discuss it further than to say it is the finest building of its kind I have seen. As far as being clean, it was practically spotless, and every room seen showed that care and labour is not spared.

The school, I understand, is built fireproof. Just before I visited it, a shipment of fire extinguishers had arrived which the Rev. Father will have placed at various points within the building. The fire escapes are well built and in good condition, as is the hose, which is practically new. The only weak point, as considered by the Rev. Father, and I believe he is right, is the pressure tank. This tank will only hold between 700 and 800 gals., which, in the case of a big fire, would certainly not be sufficient. The Rev. Father suggested that a tower tank be erected outside so that the barns and other outbuildings might also be protected. The supply of water appears plentiful, so that it is simply a matter of storage from which it can best be obtained when needed.

There are two large barns, one for cattle and one for horses. The one is new, while the other, although older, is in splendid repair. It is, however, badly in need of paint. A new building was erected this year, part to be used as a slaughter house and part as an ice house. The Rev. Father was allowed \$900.00, and I consider the Department has certainly received value. The building is well built, with a well equipped slaughter house and, adjoining it, an ice house. This building, which is under one roof, is not painted and should receive paint this coming year. There is also a well built pig pen and chicken house, both of which are painted. The same remark applies to the outbuildings as I made in regards to the school. They are the best I have inspected. The other outbuildings are old and of little use. The old laundry is used as a residence for the Farming Instructor, but certainly is not satisfactory. A residence is badly needed. Two other old houses are nearby, which are used to accommodate

to accommodate Indian parents who visit the school. The mechanic is a married man and resides in Duck Lake. Rev. Father Delmas considers this man should be within call at any time and desires a residence for him.


The Rev. Father complained about the lack of a storehouse for vegetables. It is useless to grow large quantities and have no place in which to keep them, and yet I think we must admit that they are essential and some suitable place should be provided.

A large herd of cattle is kept, from which milk and meat are provided for the school.

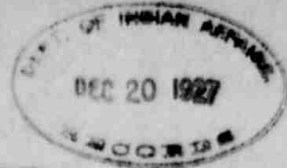

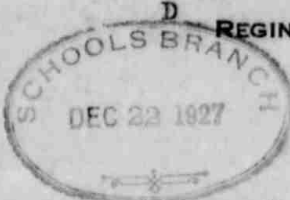

Dear Mr. Scott:-

I beg to enclose herewith a report on the various schools in the Duck Lake Agency, which were inspected by Mr. Hamilton during his recent visit to that agency.

With reference to the Inspector's remarks regarding the baking of bread by Mrs. Bird, teacher at the North Day School, James Smith's Reserve, it seems to me this is rather heavy work for her in addition to teaching school. The proper thing would be to supply them with biscuits, and if you will authorize this I will see that it is carried out. With regard to the interior decorations that will be needed at this point, I may say we have placed an amount of \$75.00 in the Estimates for general repairs at this school.

At the South Day School on James Smith's reserve I note that the teacher, Mrs. Burbridge, prepares a midday meal for the children and that she also bakes bread. This work is too heavy and I would recommend that they be supplied with biscuits at this point also. The Inspector points out that the children eat in the classroom at this school, as no other place is provided. I may say that a note of this was made in the Estimates but no amount was fixed; it was left for the Department to insert the amount which they considered would be necessary.

The John Smith's Day School is taught by Mr. Waite, who is reported to be doing good work. The Inspector points out that the school is in good condition, but that the teacher's residence needs some repairing. I may say that I placed an amount of \$75.00 in the Estimates for repairs at this school. However, I have written a separate letter to the Department asking, if the funds are available, that we be allowed to go ahead with this work now.

The Moose Woods Day School is a simple institution and we are not getting very far with our school work here. The children would be much better in a Boarding School. I have asked for a new heater for the classroom and also one for the teacher's residence.

St. Michael's Indian Residential School is one that the Inspector speaks very highly of. I question whether the Department will be inclined to put up an outside tank for fire protection only at this institution. The tank in the school, with the additional fire protection appliances might meet all the requirements. However, this is a matter for the Department to decide. The matter of painting the old outbuildings at this school should receive consideration. Nothing was placed in the Estimates to cover this work, but if it is not too late I think it might be well to insert an item of \$1200.00 for this purpose.

With reference to the Inspector's remarks regarding residences for the Farming Instructor and the Mechanic, amounts have been placed in the Estimates to provide for these buildings, as well as an amount to provide for a storehouse.

The report on the whole would lead one to believe that the Duck Lake School is in splendid shape and well managed.

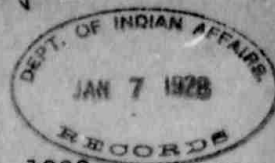

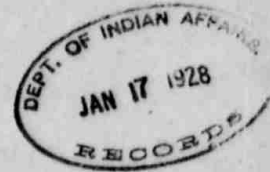

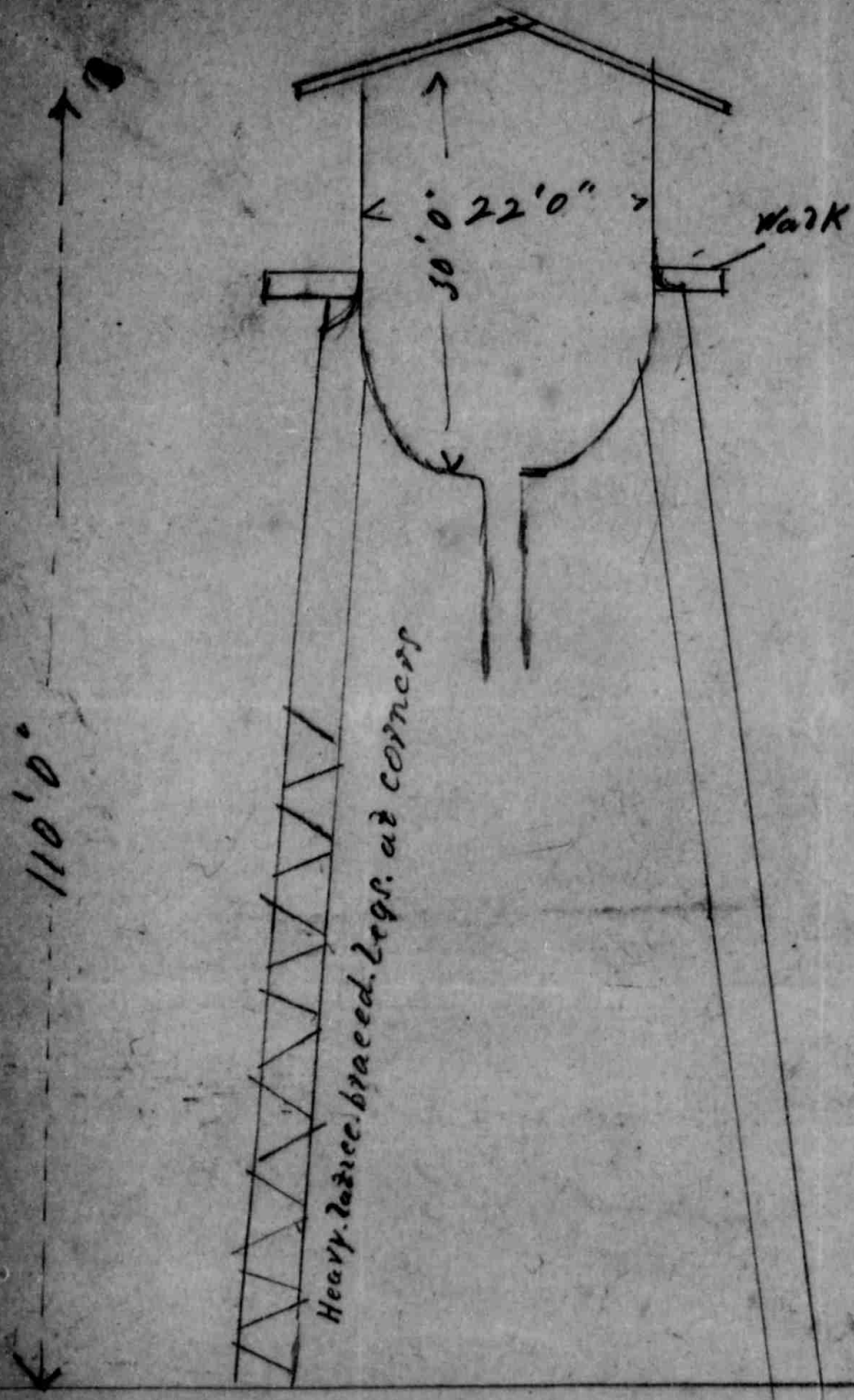

In reply to your telephone message regarding water tank at the Penitentiary, the particulars are as follows :-

Capacity. 80,000 Gals.

Tank is 22 feet in diameter.

Height from bottom to eave. 30 feet.

Eave is 110 Feet from the ground.

You will note from the above dimensions that even if it was possible to take it down whole, it could not be transported and we think that it would be an enormous task to cut all the rivets which will run into thousands, 100 feet up in the air. We believe also that it would be quite a job to make the tank tight again. The sections would bound to be distorted with all that pounding and a torch would not be any good if the tank was to be used again.

The governor of the Penitentiary wants the tank out of the way and does not know how to get it away, so he thought that if he offered it to some other department, they would move it for him. We should think that the best way to get it down would be to pull it over onto a large pile of straw, or something like that & then start to take it apart. Anyway, it is a job for a bridge gang. It was erected by the Chicago Bridge Co, and in the course of its erection, six men were very severely hurt.

Dear Mr. Scott:-

With reference to your telegrams of the 4th. and 7th. instants, and my replies of the 6th. and 10th. respectively I beg to say that I am now in a position to give you all the information you wished to have regarding the taking down and removing of the water tank from the Prince Albert penitentiary and erecting same at Duck Lake.

The first offer I received was from the Dominion Bridge Company, Winnipeg, who gave a price of approximately \$3600.00, plus freight. The next was from Priel Bros., of Saskatoon, General Contractors, who quoted a definite price of \$3700.00, plus freight. I had this tank examined by a practical man who is in the employ of Messrs. Smith Bros. & Wilson of this City, and who is looking after the erection of the new Court House in Prince Albert and I am submitting herewith his report, together with a rough sketch of the tank.

I am also in receipt of a report from Mr. Murison, in which he states that he made an examination of the tower in company with a practical constructional steel man who was sent up from Saskatoon by Mr. Priel. However, he merely gives a description of the tank and states that it is in good condition.

Dear Mr. Scott.-

On my arrival here from Ottawa, I received a letter from the Principal of St. Michael Residential School at Duck lake, Father Delmas, asking me to see you about the following items.

Father Guy in a previous letter to Father Delmas had written to him that your Department was to give him \$5000 dollars for the buildings of two residences, one for his engineer and the other for his farmer, and \$900 dollars for implements shed.

Father Delmas asks you as a favor:

amount I.- To be notified by yourself of the voted for his school. 2.- For what purpose the money has been voted, what amount for the construction of his buildings and what amount for the reparations.

3.- The authorization to himself or the Agent whenever it is possible, to control and super-intend the construction of these buildings and reparations, in order to make it impossible for Regina to cut down the estimated voted by the Department or to change the purpose for which these estimates had been voted. This power thus conferred either on the Agent or the Principal would make possible the employment of local labor men and the money spent in the localities in which the constructions or reparations are made.

If his demand is granted, Father Delmas would like to be notified as soon as possible, so that the works might be done immediately after the seeding, as it is the proper time to get workmen at low wages, where-as later in July, August and September the wages are higher owing to the great demand from the farmers paying big wages.

I heartily recommend to your favor these wishes of father Delmas who is doing such a splendid work for the honor of the Department and the benefit of the Indians.

Dear Mr. Graham:-

I have the honour to submit the following report on the schools of the Duck Lake Agency which were visited between February 19th and March 16th, during which time I inspected the Agency.

ST. MICHAEL'S INDIAN RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL.

I inspected this school on February 19th, and found everything in its usual good condition and spotlessly clean.

The school work is carried on in four classrooms, and I believe progress is being made. The children were not afraid to speak out and apparently understood their work. The books were all well kept and their work neatly set down. The pupils were neatly dressed and clean. The classrooms were well aired and all the rooms presented a cheerful appearance.

The sewing room is large and well lighted. It is well equipped with tables, sewing machines and cupboards for the storing of new garments and material. The work in this department is almost beyond criticism, and the girls certainly receive a splendid training which should be of great service to them.

The laundry is well equipped with a power washer, drier and roller for pressing or ironing clothes. The work in this department is heavy, but with such splendid equipment neither the Sisters in charge or the girls appear to find the work hard.

The kitchen is well equipped, and I found it very clean and tidy. The work in this Department was carried on without any fuss or excitement and one could hardly credit that meals were being provided for 160 to 175 people.

The dormitories were well aired and the beds neatly made and covered with white spreads.

The building is well equipped with fire extinguishers which are placed in convenient places. The water pressure is low and on the top floor the pressure is practically nil. There is only one tank in the school, the capacity of which is about 600 gals. of water. This is certainly not a large supply in case of fire. The approach to the fire escapes is through windows from each flat. The windows are the ordinary windows with outside sash which are hooked on. This is a very awkward arrangement. These windows should be made in one sash and put on hinges so that they could be opened as a door. The exit windows are above the radiators, which have recently been changed, so that now they are even with the window sills, and if the window sash were placed on hinges, the exit to the fire escape would be greatly improved. The cost for this change would not be great. The day I inspected the school the children were just recovering from the Flu, and as the weather was extremely cold, no fire drill was carried out.

The barns were all tidy, and well cleaned. 20 head of milk cows were stabled, and of this number about 10 were fresh, so that the school had abundance of milk.

The new machine shed was filled to capacity, and the two new houses built for the Farmer and Mechanic presented a good appearance and, I understand, are quite comfortable.

The school, as a whole, showed that the Principal, the Rev. Father Delmas, had the situation well in hand, and undoubtedly the children are receiving the best of instruction and care.

Dear Mr. Scott:-

I beg to enclose herewith Inspector Hamilton's report on the St. Michael's Indian Residential School and on the Day Schools on the John Smith's and James Smith's Reserves, as well as the school at Moose Woods, all under the jurisdiction of the Indian Agent at Duck Lake.



As I sign for in mind the provision of an elevated water tank and the use of water in school

The report on the St. Michael's School shows that everything in connection with the work is very satisfactory. There is one matter, however, that I might draw to the attention of the Department and that is the Inspector's remarks regarding fire protection. Do the Department think we have adequate protection so far as water is concerned? I think that the window sashes opposite the fire escapes should be altered, and I am giving the Principal instructions to do this. I also think he should have a small step ladder, to be placed under the window when the alarm rings, as it seems to be quite a climb over the radiator to the window for small children.

With reference to the repairs to the fences at the John Smith's Day School, I might say an item of \$50.00 was placed in the Estimates for this.

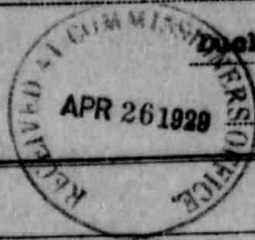

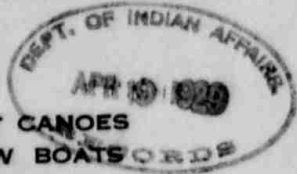

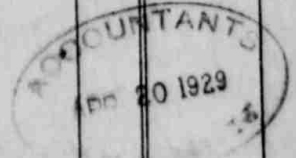

REPORT ON WATER SUPPLY AT INDIAN SCHOOL AT DUCK LAKE.

There are about 150 pupils resident in the school, both boys and girls and 20 of a staff, making a total of 170.

In the basement there are 2 pressure tanks, one for soft water from the roof and one for the well water. Each tank is about 4 feet in diameter and 14 feet long giving an approximate capacity of 1,000 gallons for each tank or say 700 gallons of water. Light and power are generated in the institution by a 15 horse power gasoline engine which charges batteries. There is one, 5 horse power motor operating the washing machine in the laundry and one, quarter horse power motor operating the soft water pump.

Soft water is collected in a concrete tank immediately behind the building, the tank being about 20 feet in diameter and 9 feet deep. There are two wells, one of which is connected up to the main building and the other supplies two houses and the two barns.

The well first referred to is about 100 feet deep and has an 8" casing. The pump is operated by a two horse power motor, the pump house being connected up by overhead wires to the power plant in the main building. There is also in this pumphouse a six horse power gasoline engine which is not used at the present time but can be connected with the pump should the power break down.

The pump is made by Goulds Manufacturing Company and on a test made on April 22nd 1929 it was found that water was being pumped at the rate of 8 gallons per minute.

The cost of operating the power plant is represented by the consumption of about four barrels of gas per month. Gas costs the institution 27 cents per gallon and at 45 gallons to the barrel, this would mean a monthly maintenance cost of about \$48, one quarter of which it is estimated is chargeable to pumping.

The water is pumped to the institution through a 2" pipe for a distance of 955 feet as shown on the plan. The other well has also a depth of 100 feet with a 6" casing. It is fitted with a pump operated by a 1½ horse power engine, the capacity of the pump is stated to be 3 gallons per minute. Pipe lines supply two houses and the two barns as shown on the plan. The number of stock watered at the barns is about 40 in winter and 20 in summer.

There is in addition one six horse power gasoline engine which is at the present used for sawing wood.

The proposal is to provide an elevated tank of say 25,000 gallons capacity and connect up both wells to this tank in order to provide suitable pressure and storage for fire fighting purposes both at the main building and at the two barns. The school is equipped with hose pipes on each floor but in the event of fire there is only a matter of 700 gallons of water available at the present time.

With an elevated tank to provide storage and fire pressure for the building, it is necessary that better pumping equipment be provided so that in the event of the tank being emptied for fire or other purposes it may be filled again within a reasonable period and also may be kept filled in the event of fire. It is therefore suggested that two new pumps be provided as follows:-

At well No. 1 a pump with necessary piping, fittings and valves having a capacity of 1200 to 1500 gallons per hour and operated by a ten horse power gas engine; cost \$1,265.

At well No. 2, 16 foot wind-mill with 40 feet tower, pump with necessary piping, fittings and valves having a capacity of 650 gallons per hour; cost \$ 895.

One, 25,000 gallon wood storage tank on 60 foot steel tower with equipment for preventing water from freezing; cost erected \$3,935.

Seven hundred feet of supply and connecting pipe including labor; cost \$1,055.
\$7,150.

With the equipment above suggested the wind-mill would probably keep the building supplied with water at no maintenance cost. The pump at well No. 1 with the ten horse power motor would be required for filling the tank and maintaining the water level in the event of fire and could be regarded as emergency equipment.

The water in well No. 2 is of practically the same quality as in well No. 1 and the use of a wind-mill to operate the pump at this well is considered more economical. This well would also be connected up with the overhead tank, and pipe lines would be taken to the two barns and if necessary the two residences adjoining, which would permit of all buildings having the required pressure at all times.

The wooden storage tank is suggested in preference to a steel tank inasmuch as the former can be obtained for about \$2,000 less.

Regarding the additional maintenance cost of operating the new equipment, ~~the consumption of gasoline~~ the consumption of gasoline for the proposed engine at well No. 1 would be about one gallon per horse power per day of 24 hours, so that if the engine were running six hours, two and one-half gallons would be consumed. Normally, however, the wind-mill will keep the elevated tank filled and well No. 1 will not be in use, which will result in a saving of about \$12.00 per month instead of an additional maintenance cost.

The protection against fire at the Indian School at Duck Lake is at the present time nil, and it is most desirable that the lives of the pupils and the property of the Department be protected by some scheme similar to that above proposed.

Sir:-

The question of supplying an elevated tank at the Duck Lake Indian Residential School for the storing of water for use in connection with fire protection, laundry work and general consumption, is one that has been brought to the attention of the Department before, and at one time it was thought we might be able to move to the school site a water tank that belonged to the Penitentiary at Prince Albert. I sent an Inspector up there to look at this tank but it was found that to remove it to the school would be impracticable. I have had a competent man go over the situation at the school and I am enclosing herewith his report, which contains an estimate of the cost of a proposed system. The Department might consider putting in a wooden tank instead of a galvanized iron tank. I should be glad to see this work undertaken, as I think it is absolutely necessary; we should have an adequate water supply at this institution.



Last week we noticed that our supply of feed for our stock got heated and spoiled. The roof of our granary, having been built eighteen years ago, with long pieces of tin on rafters, without any lumber, neither shingles, is very leaky.

To protect our coming crop, it is necessary to have a new roof on the granary being waterproof, built with lumber and shingles on it.

The dimensions of the granary are 46 x 31 and the cost of the new roof will be approximately three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350.00), including lumber, rafters, shingles, nails and work.

So I am asking you, Dear Sir, to recommend to the Department the erection of that new roof as most important and obtain the necessary authority to have that work done as soon as possible.

Sir:

I have the honour to forward attached hereto copy of a communication I have received from the Principal of the Duck Lake Residential School.

The tin roof of the granary referred to is now useless, being perforated by rust and loosened from the rafters by wind and rain.

In order to safely store the light crop which they hope to harvest at the school this autumn it is necessary that the roof of the granary be renewed i.e. the tin removed and the rafters recovered with boards and shingles.

As stated above the crop at the school is light, very light because of the poor weather we have had; cold during the Spring and early summer, and very hot and extremely dry in July and August. One hundred acres of their wheat crop was mowed down not being fit to harvest in the usual way, this will be fed to the stock in lieu of hay, the latter crop not yielding 50% of what it did last year.



In this connection I have to say that the Department will approve of an expenditure not exceeding the sum of \$350 in having a new lumber and shingled roof placed on the granary. It is expected that the school authorities will carry out the greater part of the labour and any freighting of the material required, and, if possible, the cost to the Department for material, etc., should be kept at a lower amount than that authorized above. You should forward a certified voucher, in duplicate, covering the expenditure incurred for the material and labour that it is really necessary to engage. I am sending you today two containers in order that you may obtain samples of water from your two wells when I shall be glad to furnish you with an opinion as to their comparative suitability for use.

You will find inside the containers a yellow form which you might fill out for each well so far as your information goes. You might designate the wells number 1 and number 2, number 1 being the well which is at present connected up with the school and number 2 the well which supplies the house and the two barns.

I have been discussing the question of pumps and wind mills with the maker's representatives in Regina and they have confirmed the opinion that I expressed, that it should be unwise to recommend any larger size of pump until the two wells had been tested out. Would you therefore arrange for the following test to be made on each well:

- (1) The distance from the ground surface to the water level in the well to be noted.
- (2) The pump to be started up and kept operating continuously for a period of say four hours.
- (3) At the end of this period the distance from the ground surface to the water level in the well to be again measured. By making the above observations it will be possible to estimate what size of a pump can safely be installed without danger of closing up the well by admitting too much sand.
- (4) The capacity of each of the two pumps is also required. This may be arrived at by disconnecting the pipe line and pumping direct into some large vessel and recording the number of seconds or minutes required to fill a tank of known capacity.

If you will be good enough to arrange for this information to be forwarded to me in the course of a few days it will be of considerable assistance in enabling me to give you reliable advice.

I received your letter of the 27th, and was glad to know that the report which I sent you seemed to be what you wanted

Regarding the best location for the proposed water tower I would recommend the location which we discussed on the ground, namely just south of the two houses used by the Indians and south of the existing two inch water line from number one well to the building.

I think you will see the spot marked in pencil on the blue print.

With reference to the guarantee that the water will not freeze, the firm who supply the water tower will provide for this. There is special heating apparatus arranged for under the water tower at a cost of about \$300.00 which is included in the price which I gave you and the firm who install the tower should be asked to give a guarantee on this matter.

I am quite satisfied that the water from number two well can be made perfectly safe for drinking purposes. It is true that the examination showed the presence of B. Celi, but this is simply due to some surface contamination entering at the top of the well and this can easily be prevented in making all connections perfectly watertight when the wind-mill is erected.

REPORT ON WATER SUPPLY AT INDIAN SCHOOL AT DUCK LAKE.

There are about 150 pupils resident in the school, both boys and girls and 20 of a Staff, making a total of 170.

In the basement there are two pressure tanks, one for soft water from the roof and one for the well water. Each tank is about 4 feet in diameter and 14 feet long giving an approximate capacity of 1000 gallons for each tank or say 700 gallons of water. Light and power are generated in the institution by a 15 horse power gasoline engine which charges batteries. There is one, 5 horse power motor operating the washing machines in the laundry and one, quarter horse power motor operating the soft water pump.

Soft water is collected, in a concrete tank immediately behind the building, the tank being about 20 feet in diameter and 9 feet deep. There are two wells, one of which is connected up to the main building and the other supplies two houses and the two barns.

The well first referred to is 100 feet deep and has an 8" casing. The pump is operated by a two horse power motor, the pump house being connected up by overhead wires to the power plant in the main building. There is also in this pumphouse a six horse power gasoline engine which is not used at the present time but can be connected with the pump should the power break down.

The pump is made by Goulds Manufacturing Company and on a test made on April 22nd. 1929 it was found that water was being pumped at the rate of 8 gallons per minute.

The cost of operating the power plant is represented by the consumption of about four barrels of gas per month. Gas costs the institution 27 cents per gallon and at 45 gallons to the barrel, this would mean a monthly maintenance cost of about \$48, one quarter of which it is estimated is chargeable to pumping.

The water is pumped to the institution through a 2" pipe for a distance of 955 feet as shown on the plan. The other well has also a depth of 100 feet with a 6" casing. It is fitted with a pump operated by a 1 1/2 horse power engine, the capacity of the pump is stated to be 3 gallons per minute. Pipe lines supply two houses and the two barns as shown on the plan. The number of stock watered at the barns is about 40 in winter and 30 in summer.

There is in addition one six horse power gasoline engine which is at the present used for sawing wood.

The proposal is to provide an elevated tank of say 25,000 gallons capacity and connect up both wells to this tank in order to provide suitable pressure and storage for fire fighting purposes both at the main building and at the two barns. The school is equipped with hose pipes on each floor but in the event of fire there is only a matter of 700 gallons of water available at the present time.

I have been in touch with the manufacturers of pumps, wind-mills and water tanks getting quotations from them, furthermore I have been visiting at various points in the Province in connection with other matters.

Your letter of April 24th. giving the results of the test of the wells was duly received and the information was given to the pump manufacturers.

I have now heard from the firms to whom I wrote and have given you my estimates in the accompanying report.

I trust that the information may be of some service to you and if there is anything further which you wish to have explained, please do not hesitate to write me.

I am today returning to you, under separate cover, the blue print which you were good enough to lend to me on the occasion of my inspection



I found these children all well along in their grades, and they were not timid and backward in answering questions. They were all neatly dressed and were clean in person.

The classrooms were all clean and properly ventilated. The registers were neatly marked and timetables were made out for each room.

The teachers appear to be getting good results, and the discipline is excellent.

The work in the sewing room, laundry, and kitchen was all in progress during my visit, and all departments were under excellent supervision, and splendid work is being done.

The dormitories were clean. All beds were neatly made, and the rooms were well aired.

The school is provided with fire extinguishers and the necessary equipment. A water tower was estimated for this year, and, if granted, will provide splendid protection against fire. At present the supply tanks are too small. Fire drill is observed, but on account of the rain and mud, it was not carried out during my inspection.

The barns and outbuildings I found in good repair.

A large herd of cattle is kept, and sufficient milk is always available for the children.

The work on the land was well along, and this year the crop will be as follows:-

The farm work seen was well done, and I believe the children of this school are receiving splendid care and an excellent training in the various departments.

A root cellar is badly needed as a large quantity of vegetables are grown each year. This, as well as a storehouse, was asked for in the Estimates.

The Assistant Principal was in charge as the Rev. Father Delmas was away in the East. I was pleased with the discipline and the general management of the school, and I found excellent care being given to all Government property.

I beg to enclose herewith a report of an inspection made by Mr. Hamilton of the various schools in the Duck Lake Indian Agency.

St. Michael's R.C. School.

You will note there is an enrolment of 135 here, and that the school was found in its usual good shape, the children clean and tidy, and well fed. Reference is made to the fire equipment. I have your authority to go ahead with the erection of a water tower, and we are now getting prices and dealing with the matter.

With reference to a root cellar for vegetables, this was estimated for but as yet has not been authorized.

John Smith's Indian Day School.

The report on this school is quite satisfactory. The suggestion to convert the present garden into a playground for the children is a good one. An item was placed in the Estimates to provide some playground equipment but as yet I have not received authority to make the purchase.



Sir:-

With reference to the matter of a water supply at the Duck Lake Indian Residential School, I beg to say that after going into the question further I have decided to recommend that the Department abandon the idea of having an elevated tank outside.

I have discussed the matter with several people who depend upon water other than from a city supply and the majority are in favour of the pressure tank system in a country like this where there is so much frost, and the expense of keeping a tank warm is great. The fact that these tanks are being abandoned at certain places should be sufficient reason for the Department not to go on with the installation of one at Duck Lake. I admit that this was at first recommended by me after having had the advice of certain people, but I am satisfied now that it would be a mistake.

I would ask for your authority to put in a pressure tank system, and I might say that I had Mr. Millar of the Fairbanks-Morse Company go up to Duck Lake, and he recommends that a hole be dug in the ground close to the boiler room, covered with concrete, to receive two tanks 48" in diam. by 24 ft. long, with approximate capacity each of 2260 gals. He also recommends that on Well No. 1 a deep well turbine pump be placed with an approximate capacity of 170 gals. per minute, directly connected to

vertical motor and automatically controlled by pressure in tanks, and a 3" pipe line from same well to main building and connected to tanks. On Well No. 2, a 16 ft. windmill on 50 ft. tower connected to deep well pump, connecte@ to main 3" line pipe.

This matter was discussed with Father Delmas, and he is quite satisfied to have this change made, as he claims he knows nothing about the elevated tanks.

The cost of installing this system will be considerably less than for the system first proposed, and more satisfactory.

As there is urgency in this matter I should be glad if you would let me know by wire if I may proceed with the work.

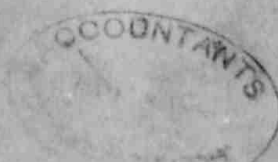

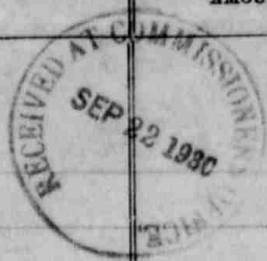

It is with a great uneasiness that I have to bring to your knowledge that we had a very bad luck with out windmill. As soon as we noticed that we were going to have a great storm, on Saturday night, we stopped the windmill to keep it on the safe way.

Unfortunately we found it yesterday morning so badly broken that it is beyond repairs.

It worked with very good satisfaction for nearly a month; supplying three quarters of the water required without any cost. We never noticed anything wrong in its structure. But Mr. Miller of the Fairbanks-Morse Co. never inspected it. As the contract is not completed it up to him to supply a new one.

We might be in a very bad position, regarding our water supply supposing that now the old pump of Well No. 1 gives away, before the electric power, provided by the Saskatchewan Power Commission reaches us.

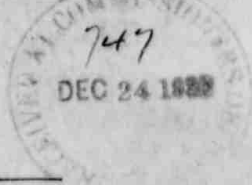

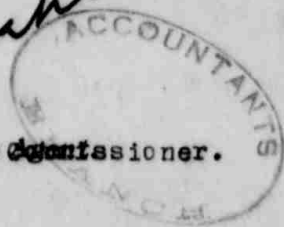

I received a visit from the Reverend Father Delmas, Principal of the Indian Residential School at Duck Lake, yesterday afternoon, and he explained to me that, as the Saskatchewan Power Commission's line was passing through and operating in Duck Lake, he had made arrangements for taking their current at the Residential School. This involved the installation of two or three small motors to meet the necessary change to an alternating system, the order for which he placed with the Canadian Fairbanks-Morse Company. He brought with him the account therefor amounting to \$149.40. I enclose Regina voucher No. 11 for that amount and beg to recommend payment thereof. The plant that was in use there now becomes available for any other like institution and is held at the school at the disposal of the Department. The equipment includes one 15 H.P. engine with ~~the~~ battery, a 7½ H.P. and 3 H.P. motor, together with a pump which was being used at the well. The Reverend Father arranged for the change himself, but I think his action was justified as the cost of operation will be less than heretofore.

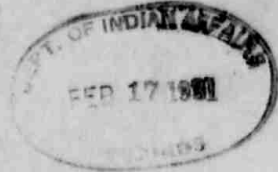

Principal of the Duck Lake Indian Residential School, in which he informs me that he has on hand one 15 h.p. engine, 2 motors (direct)-56 batteries, all in good order. Since the school has been connected up with the Saskatchewan Power Commission, these are surplus to the requirements at the school.

I am advised that in order to keep the batteries in good shape they should be charged regularly, and as batteries are required from time to time at various points, I am instructing the Principal to have the 56 batteries sent to Regina, where I shall have them re-charged and stored, and when batteries are required at any point we can supply them from here.

I should like you to bear in mind that we have this engine and motors on hand at Duck Lake. Also the batteries, which as I say will be stored here in Regina. There will be a small charge for having these batteries shipped and re-charged, but this is the only thing to do in the matter.

Permit me to ask you to render us a service
from the Department.

Since the 10th of January, 23 receive light
from the Provincial Electric Power, of Saskatoon. Mr.
Graham had some motors, required for the alternating
current, sent us by the Department.

Now we need about 10 posts more and stronger
wire for the motor of the pump and the buildings
outside.

Could you possibly insist with Mr. Ferrier so
that Mr. Graham could make the necessary arrangements
with the Saskatchewan Power Commission to that effect.
This work would cost about \$600.

It is ourselves and not the Department who
have installed the electric wire of the old building
on old red spruce posts to bring the power to the
pump and the light to the outside buildings.

We have, at the disposal of the Department
an engine of 15 horse power with dynamo and 54 batter-
ies, all in good order; also 2 direct current motors;
one for the pump and the other one for the laundry.







Sir:-

I have the honour to forward herewith my report respecting the Duck Lake Indian Residential School for the month of January 1931.

While visiting through the buildings the Sister in charge of the Laundry Department drew my attention to the fact that they have no means for boiling certain linens which should be boiled or for heating the sad irons, except on the Kitchen Range, and this is not satisfactory as it interferes more or less with the preparing of meals. A small Electric Washing Machine (Family size) should also be provided for special linens or clothes which it does not do to wash in the big washer used for heavy or coarser clothing.

Two small four wheel trucks should also be provided for moving the wet clothes from the big washer to the wringer (extractor) and from there to the drying lines some of which are in the girls wash room which is quite a distance from the Laundry. Suitable boxes could be made by the school mechanic to be placed on these trucks, this would do away with a good deal of heavy lifting or sliding of tubs on the floors by the older girls who do this work.

The Laundry is not equipped with a dryer which is much needed as the drying of clothes on lines inside the building in winter is cumbersome, slow and not practical.

Now that the lighting system is connected with the Provincial Power lines, a part of the room formerly used for storage batteries which adjoins the Laundry could be made into a drying room at very little cost. I beg to ask that the Department give these matters their kind and just

Sir:-

I am enclosing herewith a report from Agent Schmidt, of which two copies were sent to this office, with regard to requests made by the Sister in charge of the Laundry Department at the Duck Lake Indian Residential School for certain equipment.

The matter of the washing machine was mentioned in Inspector Hamilton's report, and I touched upon it in my covering letter. I think a machine of this kind could very well be provided by the school.

With regard to the four-wheel trucks for moving the wet clothes, I do not think this equipment is necessary. At the Qu'Appelle School where they have twice the number of pupils they have at Duck Lake they do not use trucks, in fact I do not know of any school where they have them.

I suppose when the Department built this school they decided not to install a dryer, and I do not know that they have changed their minds.

I do think they might be supplied with a small stove on which to boil the linens and heat the irons. This seems to be essential.





enrolled. This Sister does excellent work, and the children are well along in their grades. The junior teacher for the girls is Sister St. Ulric. There are 28 children in grade 1, and 11 in grade 2. The children were bright, and I believe are making fair progress. I understand this Sister only took over the work about a year ago, and I have no doubt experience will increase confidence in herself. I understand this Sister does not hold a Saskatchewan certificate, but has a two year Quebec training. The boys' junior teacher is Sister Therese of St. Joseph, and there are 33 pupils on the roll, 24 in Grade 1, and 9 in Grade 2. These children are very alert, and I would judge good progress is made. The senior boys have Mr. Burzic, who, I understand, holds his Second Interim Certificate for Saskatchewan, and is doing excellent work. There are 32 enrolled, and the grades range from 3 to 6. The children were all well dressed, neat in appearance, and clean. The rooms were well aired, and are bright and cheerful. I found the registers neatly kept, and the attendance is excellent.

The laundry, kitchen, and sewing room are in charge of the Sisters, and excellent work is carried on. There is no confusion in any department, and the work does not appear difficult or hard. The laundry is well equipped, except for a small stove, which is needed in order that the clothes may be boiled. At present the irons are heated on the kitchen range, which is inconvenient, especially when a meal is being prepared. The kitchen is down the main hall from the laundry, and children are often passing back and forth and might easily be burned when carrying the irons, as the hall is not well lighted.

lighted. A small stove with a flat top, fitted with a copper boiler, could be used for the boiling of the clothes, and also for the heating of irons. At present no clothes are boiled, and it is impossible to keep the white clothes in good condition unless they are. The Sisters made the request for a family size electric washer, which could be used for the staff washing, and would often save, especially in holiday season, the operating of the large power washer, and it would also be a saving on water and soap.

The girls do all plain sewing, which includes the making of their own dresses, nightgowns, and overalls and shirts for the boys. In addition, they do the mending and darning, all of which is well done, and the training will be of great benefit in later life.

The dormitories are large, well aired, bright, and spotlessly clean. The beds were neatly made, and the bedding was clean.

The new pressure tanks are now in use, and good pressure is obtained throughout the building. The new pump apparently is giving good service, and the Rev. Father Delmas assured me he was well satisfied with the system.

The fire hose are in good repair, and extinguishers are placed in prominent places throughout the building. The Reverend Principal assured me that fire drill is observed regularly, and the children are familiar with what is expected of them.

The milk cows were in good condition, and are well cared for. The milk cows number about 26 head, and

several have already freshened, so that the school is receiving a fair supply of milk. In addition to the milk cows, a herd of about 70 head is fed outside. This herd supplies the beef, and includes many young heifers which later will form part of the milking herd.

A number of brood sows are kept, and I understand that all pork needed for the institution is produced there.

I found the horses in excellent condition, and the stables were clean and in good repair.

The children were well, except for two or three with bad colds, and these were in bed receiving care and attention from the nursing Sister.

The meals consist of wheat porridge, milk, bread, grease, and tea for breakfast; for dinner and supper - meat, vegetables, bread, butter or lard, syrup or dried fruit, and tea with sugar is provided. Fish is often substituted for meat. Milk often replaces tea. The children apparently receive plenty, and the food is well prepared and wholesome.

The school, throughout, is well managed, and the staff members appear capable for the duties assigned to them.

I beg to forward herewith a very satisfactory report on the schools in the Duck Lake Agency, comprising three Day Schools and one Residential School.

You will note that at the Moose Woods Day School there is an enrolment of 13 pupils, with an average attendance of 12.15, and that the children are neatly dressed and clean in appearance. This speaks very well for the parents on this reserve, who are not under the guidance of a White Instructor, but merely the influence of the teacher, Miss Hare, who is quite capable. The Inspector points out that the school and residence are in good repair, but that both buildings are badly in need of painting, and that a fence is also required. I would point out that \$150.00 was placed in the Estimates for painting, and \$85.00 for a fence. I should be glad to see these items approved.

At the John Smith's Day School the work seems to be carried on under a capable teacher. The attendance here is highly satisfactory. It is pleasing to note that here too, where we have no resident Farming Instructor, the children were found to be well clothed and neat in appearance.

At the Fort a la Corne South Day School the teacher is apparently getting splendid results, and the training the children receive will certainly be of great benefit to them in later life. The Inspector points out that there is no well at this school, which is a great handicap. There is an amount of \$100.00 in the Estimates for a well, and I hope it has not been struck out.

The Inspector points out that a new furnace is badly needed at the Fort a la Corne North Day School, as the one now in use is beyond repair. This is a matter that calls for immediate action. I may point out that we asked the Department to place an item of \$275.00 in the Supplementary Estimates to provide a furnace, and I should be glad to be advised at as early a date as possible if it is being allowed, as I would like to have the furnace installed as soon as spring comes.

The report on the Duck Lake Residential School is most satisfactory. I think the children in this school are getting a good training in all branches of the work. There is one matter which I think should be drawn to the attention of the Department, and that is that the Sister in charge of the Junior grades does not hold a Saskatchewan Certificate.

The children receive a splendid training in all branches of domestic work, but the Inspector does not state whether the girls are being taught to milk cows or not. I am rather inclined to think they are, notwithstanding the fact that there is no mention of it in the report.

You will note a request is made for a family size electric washer, so that the staff washing can be done separately. I do not know that the Department should be called upon to supply this.

I would particularly draw your attention to the wholesome meals that the children at this school receive. I know they get all the vegetables that are good for them, as well as a good quantity of fresh milk.

The report on the whole, as I say, is very satisfactory.

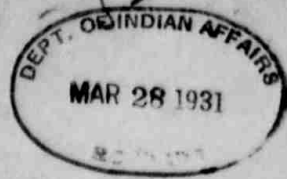

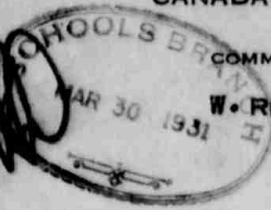

Sir:-

On the 14th February last I advised you of the dismantling of the engine and motors at the Duck Lake Indian Residential School and that I proposed to have shipped and stored at Regina the batteries in use with the 15 H.P. engine. I wrote the Principal, asking him to have them carefully packed, but received a letter from him which indicates that the proposed method of shipment could not be carried out. I therefore asked the Manager of the Delco-Light-Frigidaire Company here to advise me what would be the best arrangement to adopt in having these batteries taken care of and brought to Regina for storage. His report in reply indicates that great care must be taken and that, unless certain shipping instructions are followed out, the railway company will not accept them for transportation. The expenditure involved, including the time and expense of an expert who will have to proceed to Duck Lake to superintend the packing, will cost \$339.60, according to the estimate furnished me by Mr. J. M. Sharpe, the Manager of the Company referred to.

I do not feel justified in incurring this expenditure without submitting the matter for the consideration of the Department. I should like to be advised what action the Department desires to be taken to properly take care of these valuable batteries, which Mr. Sharpe estimates are worth about \$1,000.00.






Dear Sir,-

In reply to yours of the 9th. inst.No 109-1-5 ;
regarding certain further requirements for the electric light
service, I beg to say that knowing nothing of the arrangements
made between the Indian Commissioner and the Saskatchewan
Power Commission, I wrote to this later party and their answer
reads as follows.

*(I reply to your letter of April 14th. please be advised
that after taking up the matter of new ~~poles~~ poles and
heavier wiring at your school with Mr. Graham, it was
decided that since the present poles and wiring are in
reasonably good condition, to delay this re-arrangement
until some future date. #)

The Saskatchewan Power Commission admits that some
improvements has to be done at some future date. Poles are
very old and too short.

Considering the actual depression and the financial
difficulties of the Government I leave to the discretion of
the Department as to when and how these requirements should
be made.

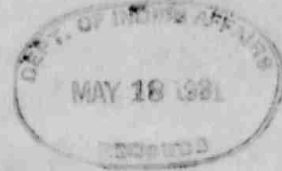
